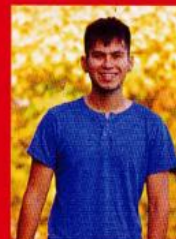
However, BOLD turned out to be worth the extra time, and quickly became one of his favorite activities on campus.
